What does LGBTQIA+ stand for?

The prefered acronym used to describe people who are gender-minorities has changed over the past few years to become even more inclusive. There are several different acronyms in current use, all of which are acceptable. The most commonly used, according to *The New York Times*, is LGBTQIA+, which stands for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer or Questioning, Intersex, Asexual/Ace or Ally. The + represents everyone who does not identify as one of the other terms.

Founded on October 6, 1876, The American Library Association (ALA) is the oldest and largest library association in the world.


The mission of ALA is "to provide leadership for the development, promotion and improvement of library and information services and the profession of librarianship in order to enhance learning and ensure access to information for all."






The First Journal for a Gay Audience

The rise of the Nazi Party in the lead-up to World War II caused the shuttering of the groundbreaking journal. Der Eigene is German for "The Own."
















The First LGBT Rights Organization


The Wissenschaftlich-humanitäres Komitee or WhK (Scientific-Humanitarian-Committee) founded in Berlin, Germany, in the Spring of 1897, acted as one of the first LGBTQ+ rights groups. The organization was created by Magnus Hirschfeld, a physician of German-Jewish descent. Hirschfeld hoped to provide a voice for LGBT people and end their legal persecution.


As with Der Eigene, Hitler's rise ultimately caused the end of the WhK. On May 6, 1933, student athletes broke into Hirschfeld's archives and publicly burned the institute's materials.


The First Pride March


The first LGBT pride march took place in New York City on June 28, 1970. It was held on the first Anniversary of the Stonewall Riots. The riots are named for the Stonewall Inn, a Gay club in New York's Greenwich Village neighborhood. The riots began when Police became violent while raiding the Stonewall Inn. The patrons fought back to defend themselves.


That first pride march was called The Christopher Street Liberation Day March by its organizers. A flyer circulated to inform people about the march read in part, "...It is our hope that the day will come when homosexuals will be an integral part of society — being treated as human beings."

















The First Positive Portrayal of a Gay Couple on American TV

The 1972 made-for-television movie, That Certain Summer, starred well-known leading actors Hal Holbrook and Martin Sheen. Highly controvercial at a time when homosexuality was still legally classified as a mental disorder, the movie was nonetheless met with critical acclaim. It won that year's Golden Globe in the category of Best Movie Made for TV.

The plot of That Certain Summer centered on a teenaged boy who learns that his divorced father now has a male partner. The movie was lauded for its realistic portrayal of a loving but messy relationship between two men.

The subject is homosexuality and the conflict is between a divorced homosexual and his adolescent son. The boy was never told the real reason his parents split up—but he's slowly and fearfully learning the truth during one San Francisco summer.

The thoughtful script, by producer Richard Levinson and William Link, is well-played by Hal Holbrook (as the homosexual), Martin Sheen (his lover), Scott Jacoby (the boy) and Hope Lange (the ex-wife).

Lamont Johnson directed on location in and around San Francisco.




PFLAG is the first and largest organization for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ+) people, their parents and families, and allies. It was founded in in 1973 by Jeanne Manford, who had participated in New York's Christopher Street Liberation Day March with her son, Morty. During the march she had been approached by numerous people, who seeing a mother and son together, asked if Jeanne would talk to their parents. Seeing a great need, she decided to begin a support group.


PFLAG's first formal meeting took place on March 11, 1973. It was held at the Metropolitan-Duane Methodist Church in Greenwich Village (since renamed the Church of the Village). Approximately 20 people attended that first meeting. Today, PFLAG has over 400 chapters nationwide.


The First Openly Gay Politician Elected in California


Harvey Milk was the first openly gay elected official in the history of California. He was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors in 1977. It was after moving to San Francisco in 1972 that Milk first became active in Civics. In his short political career he successfully sponsored a bill banning discrimination in public accommodations, housing, and employment on the basis of sexual orientation. The Supervisors passed the bill by a vote of 11-1, and it was signed into law by Mayor George Moscone. On November 27, 1978, Milk and Moscone were assassinated. Milk was posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2009.




The First Gay Lead Character on a TV Series (USA)

Ellen Degeneres became the first person to play an openly gay lead character on television in 1997. Degeneres was the star of the sitcom Ellen. Originally titled These Friends of Mine and retitled at the beginning of its second season, Ellen ran for 5 seasons in total. Both Degeneres and her character came out publicly during the series' 4th season on the air.

Today Degeneres is well known as the host of The Ellen Degeneres Show, which has run for 15 seasons, and as the voice of Dory in Disney's Finding Nemo animated films.



President Obama awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom to Ellen DeGeneres (1958-present) at a White House ceremony in 2016. He cited her work in helping to "push our country in the direction of justice."


The USA's First Legally Recognized Same-Sex Marriage

On May 17, 2004, the first legally recognized same-sex marriage in the United States took place between Marcia Kadish and Tanya McCloskey at City Hall in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The Massachusetts Supreme Court had ruled that the state's former ban on same-sex marriage was unconstitutional. This allowed same-sex couples to get a marriage licence for the first time. Over the course of that first day, 77 additional same-sex couples also got married.

In 2013, the United States Supreme Court ruled the 1996 Defense of Marriage Act to be unconstitutional. This allowed married same-sex couples to collect Federal benefits and be covered by the same legal protections afforded other couples -- such as a marriage performed in one state being legally recognized in every state. Since that landmark decision, same-sex marriage has become legal in all 50 states.
